Bonneville 2017

There are some very special places on earth that have uniqueness, and the salt flats are one of those places.

In Utah, USA, 30,000 acres of salt flats come alive once each year for the holy grail of speed.

Bonneville Speed Week.

This year was the 69th event and 50 years since Burt Munro set the record on the old Indian, which still stands today.

We booked in at Wendover, some 15 minutes from the racing and we spent four days on the salt surrounded by other car loving people. Each day we headed out some two miles on the salt to the start line, parked up and found some friendly people with some shade as the temperate was in the high 40 s, but then you also had the glare off the salt to deal with. A lot of water was needed to keep running at peak condition and a well iced chilly bin.

A wide range of vehicles run down the track in a number of classes, all individual which we loved, with one thing on their mind, speed on the salt. Vehicles lined up to take their turn,

- Electric
- Turbine
- Streamliners
- Roadsters
- Pickups
- Motor bikes

There are many special groups of racers both past and present in the 200 MPH/300MPH and 400 MPH clubs.

We met Lee Munro from Christchurch, Burt's nephew, riding for the Indian Factory team .He said that the salt was often rough, and not as smooth as you would think and you just had to hold on, pick your path and open that throttle at the right time. Sharyn also meet Burt's son, John a very young 82 year old as you can see in the photo .He said that the movie was just like Burt in real life and was shown on a big screen on the salt by Indian Motorcycle Factory team on the second night .

It was quite casual in the start area and you could wander amongst the vehicles without being told off .We laughed and couldn't quite believe our eyes when the speed Marshall was smoking a big fat cigar on the start line with all the fumes of racing vehicles around him? A blood hound had also made his way with his owner to right on the start line, though the owner did have his foot firmly on the lead holding him.

Health and Safety did cross my mind?

We took away many memories and made some new friends but one thing does stick in my mind after talking to an experienced racer, he said to us "once you leave the start line and hit the go gas with your foot, your brain shrinks and your balls get bigger "

Not the holiday spot you would choose every year, just being there one time was an event to remember forever. I am lucky to have a wife that will spend time watching such a wonderful event. With the racing coming to an end, it was time to give the car a big clean and head off to continue exploring America.
